The **STREAM-N Network** engages underserved youth ages **15–19** to steward our lands and waters for the benefit of people and wildlife. We learn from nature to enhance our impact.

STREAM~N Teams address **critical issues** impacting their communities, while developing career readiness, critical thinking, creativity and teamwork skills.

Hands-on programs build supportive community and help prepare teens for the future. They help with riparian restoration, research and other activities they choose. They work an average of 5–10 hrs./wk. in summer and 3-5 hrs./wk. during the school year.

Participants receive stipends while exploring career pathways though collaboration with partners in education, industry, the non-profit sector and government. They build self-esteem, skills and grit overcoming tough challenges together.

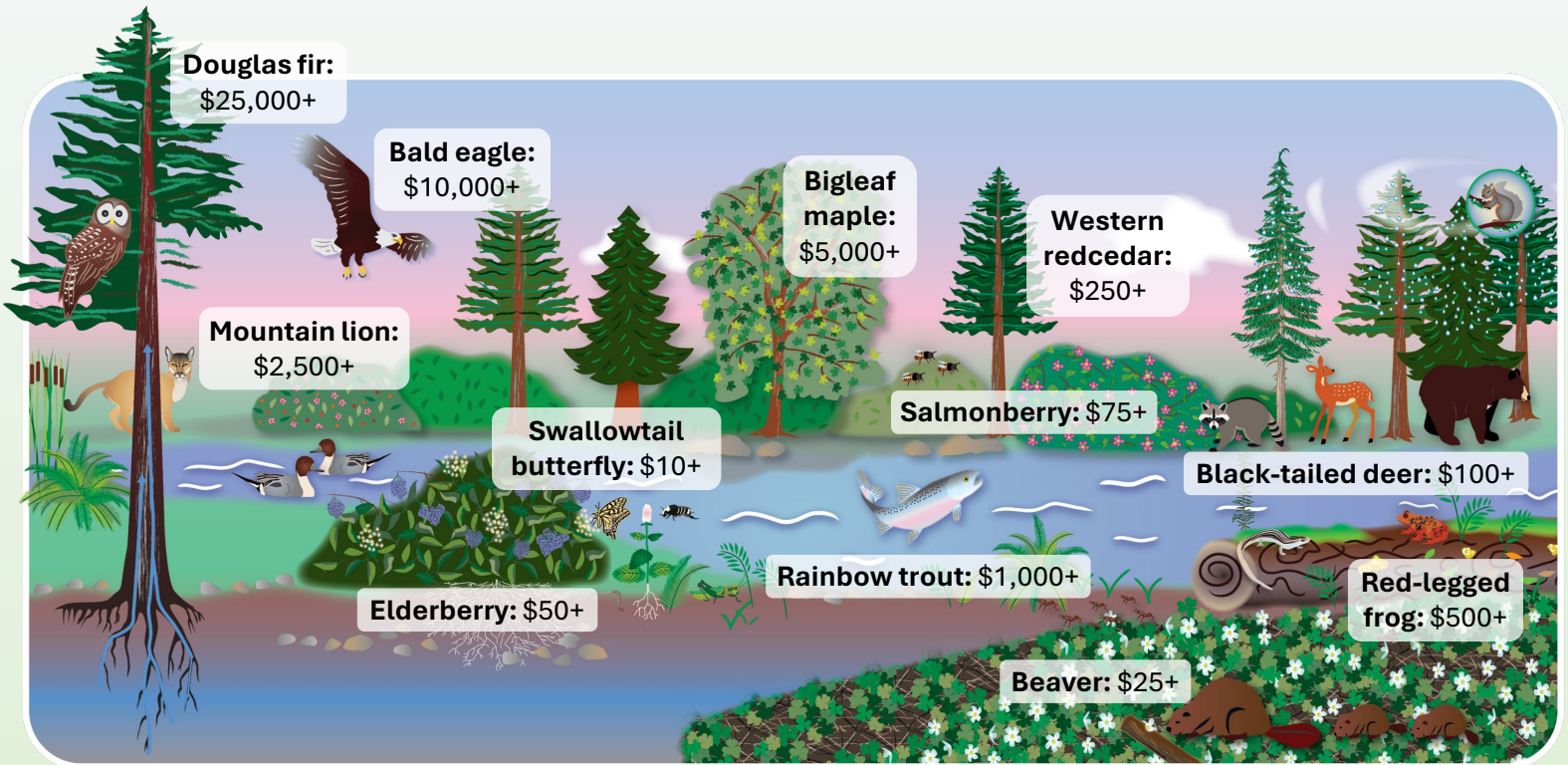
